Conducting 1 Competencies (Updated Apr 10, 2019)



(a) Readiness

1. Has taken Core Training or has been an active company member for six months.

(b) Performance

- 1. Is audible on stage.
- 2. Has presence onstage.
- 3. Awareness of sightlines: teller, performers & audience.
- 4. Can give, take & share focus.
- 5. Confident grasp of basic forms: fluid sculptures, pairs and stories/scenes.
- 6. Familiar with other forms: tableau, 3-sentence story, etc.
- 7. Can express self physically with effectiveness.

(c) Conducting

- 1. Has experienced conductor role.
- 2. Knows basic questions in conducting story: Where, when, who, what happened, and how does the story end.
- 3. Can ask follow-up questions during interview to uncover essences, shape the story, inform and inspire the actors.
- 4. Can create rapport with teller and audience.
- 5. Can maintain connection to performing team during interview.
- 6. Able to manage simultaneous focus of audience, teller, actors, musician.
- 7. Understand the difference between the functions of emotion-based short forms (warming up the audience), narrative-based short forms (begin exploring narrative experiences), and narrative-based long forms (inviting fuller stories).
- 8. Has understanding that different types of questions invite and shape the content into the various forms.

(d) Music

- 1. Knows the basic functions of PT music.
- 2. Willingness to use instruments and voice at music station.
- 3. Can execute basic music for set up of scenes (long form).

(e) Ritual

- 1. Understanding stage set-up: position of teller chair, actors' line, music station, etc.
- 2. Appropriate use and timing of "Let's Watch."
- 3. Understand the arc of the playback show: Intro, short forms, long forms, reflections, closing.

(f) Personal

- 1. Can communicate with integrity from a place of curiosity and honest communication.
- 2. Can accept deep emotion from others.
- 3. Can connect self to context, relating to the audience using intuition and spontaneity.

(g) Social Change

- 1. Acknowledges own privilege or lack of privilege.
- 2. Understands how difference affects stories.
- 3. Has awareness of and listens for different voices in the group.

(h) Theory

- 1. Understands basic values of Playback.
- 2. Understands rules of ritual.
- 3. Has been exposed to concept of red thread and narrative reticulation.
- 4. Awareness of social dynamics and subgroups.
- 5. Familiar with the basic components of a narrative: story-sense, beginning, middle, end, turning point, etc.
- 6. Understand the spectrum between safe unsafe, relevant irrelevant and how it affects openness and trust in a group.
- 7. The different roles and functions of conductor: communicating between audience and performer, determining pace and highlighting emergent themes, and guiding the collective journey of the audience.

(i) Ethics

- 1. Understands the importance of respectfully attuning to the context.
